Support Teaching in Our School

Support Teaching in Our School

It is our priority that every child should feel welcome and supported in school. Support teaching is part of how we do this. Support teaching might look like a second teacher supporting in class, or a teacher taking a small group of children, or one child, for additional support outside of class. This support can be for academic reasons, or for social, emotional or behavioural support. Over their 8 years with us, all children will receive some level of support.

Here are some of the key points from the Department of Education Guidelines on support teaching in schools. The Department use the term 'Special Education Teacher'.

★ Support for all

Your child's class teacher is their main source of support. If more help is needed, a support teacher may provide in class, small group or one-to-one teaching.

No diagnosis needed

Children don't need a formal diagnosis to get support. Support is allocated based on need. Sharing professional reports with the school is helpful, but equally, a diagnosis does not automatically mean extra support. Teaching time is limited and is allocated carefully.

5 Flexible support

Schools use a step-by-step system, the Continuum of Support, to assess the level of the support different children will get. If you have concerns, please speak to your child's class teacher

Resources

All schools receive support teaching resources, but these are limited. We can't provide support to every child who may need it at all times. Instead, we use a flexible model, often working in blocks of intervention to make the best use of resources. Our support staff use their professional judgement to decide who receives support and when.

Support Team

Our support team this year is Ms. Byrne, Ms. O'Reilly, Ms. O'Meara, Mr. Dunlop and Ms. Maher. The Support Coordinator is Ms. Maher.

Rather than let them go to waste, we were delighted to donate these books to schools in Chad, West Africa, through a special link with St John Vianney Church in Artane. What a great way to help other children enjoy their right to an education!
















Third Class
